

Greeting Friends,

Lent has arrived. Easter is around the corner. And before long (keeping my fingers crossed) the days will be warmer and longer. It is a time of change in the seasons and in the church year. LENTEN SERIES: WHAT IS A SPIRITUAL PRACTICE?



Our Lenten Series will focus on a number of spiritual practices that are foundational in Christian tradition. These are sometimes referred to as spiritual disciplines, but most of us don't like that discipline word and they really are more about how we "practice" them in our lives. The practices should be joyful and not drudgery. They should help us grow as individuals and as a community.

There are many different types of spiritual practices. We are focusing on just a few for this Lenten season:

- March 4 Generosity How do we practice generosity and graciousness with our lives? This is more than money (although that is a part of it). We are called to mirror God's generosity to the world.
- March 11 Justice-making How do we work for a world that reflects God's desire for right relationships and peace?
- March 18 Forgiveness At its heart, forgiveness is about changing ourselves and in turn our relationships. How do we "forgive our debts, as we forgive our debtors?"
- March 25 Saying Yes and Saying No What does it mean to set priorities in our lives that allows us the chance to be healthy, balanced, and in line with the values of our faith? It is about saying no to some things so that we can say yes to the right things.

Book Descriptions:

Meet Harold Fry, recently retired. He lives in a small English village with his wife, Maureen, who seems irritated by almost everything he does, even down to how he butters his toast. Little differentiates one day from the next. Then one morning the mail arrives, and within the stack of quotidian minutiae is a letter addressed to Harold in a shaky scrawl from a woman he hasn't seen or heard from in twenty years. Queenie Hennessy is in hospice and is writing to say goodbye.

Harold pens a quick reply and, leaving Maureen to her chores, heads to the corner mailbox. But then, as happens in the very best works of fiction, Harold has a chance encounter, one that convinces him that he absolutely must deliver his message to Queenie in person. And thus begins the unlikely pilgrimage at the heart of Rachel Joyce's remarkable debut. Harold Fry is determined to walk six hundred miles from Kingsbridge to the hospice in Berwick-upon-Tweed because, he believes, as long as he walks, Queenie Hennessey will live.

Still in his yachting shoes and light coat, Harold embarks on his urgent quest across the countryside. Along the way he meets one fascinating character after another, each of whom unlocks his long-dormant spirit and sense of promise. Memories of his first dance with Maureen, his wedding day, his joy in fatherhood, come rushing back to him—allowing him to also reconcile the losses and the regrets. As for Maureen, she finds herself missing Harold for the first time in years.

And then there is the unfinished business with Queenie Hennessy

A novel of unsentimental charm, humor, and profound insight into the thoughts and feelings we all bury deep within our hearts, The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry introduces Rachel Joyce as a wise—and utterly irresistible—storyteller.


THE MUSIC AND ARTS BOARD

WHAT IS A MEMBER IN DISCERNMENT?

Many of you know Nathan Roberts, but do you know that Lynnhurst is sponsoring him as a Member in Discernment for ordination with the Minnesota Conference? Members in Discernment are members of a local congregation who feel a call to ministry, and in Nathan's case ordained ministry. Lynnhurst has stood behind him in his discernment process and continues to do so as he moves toward the last stages toward ordination.

Members in Discernment demonstrate a variety of knowledge, skills, and abilities for ordained ministry. Some of this is demonstrated through seminary or educational work, some of it through building relationships within a local congregation and the wider UCC, and some of it through reflection in integrative papers and conversations that bring together a candidate's experience and knowledge. Candidates must also undergo two rounds of psychological and vocational testing. The Committee on Ministry, which evaluates candidates, is charged with ensuring that Members in Discernment meet the qualifications for ordained ministry, are fit for ministry (psychologically and emotionally), and are committed to the United Church of Christ. Leon Erstad serves on the Minnesota Conference Committee on Ministry. Throughout the process, candidates are evaluated by the Committee, their pastor (in Nathan's case both David Lindsey and I have done evaluations), and their advisor or mentor in the process (someone from another congregation who meets with and guides the discernment process).

Once a Member in Discernment has completed seminary, the Member may ask their local congregation and the Committee to be examined for potentially moving to completion of the ordination process. The Lynnhurst Diaconate supported Nathan's request last fall to the Committee on Ministry. Nathan was first examined by a subcommittee of the Committee on Ministry and recommended for an ordination panel, which is made up of representatives of the

full Committee. The ordination panel voted to recommend that Nathan complete some more steps for preparation and then return upon completion of those steps for determination of setting the date for an Ecclesiastical Council. An Ecclesiastical Council is a gathering of representatives of all the churches in the Minnesota Conference to examine a candidate and vote whether to ordain the candidate. When the time comes for Nathan's Ecclesiastical Council, we will host it here at Lynnhurst and assuming the vote is favorable, Nathan's ordination will take place here at Lynnhurst.

Below is a letter from Nathan introducing himself for some of you and catching up others on what he has been up to in his preparation and his current ministries. ~ Anita

Dear Friends at Lynnhurst,

Recently Pastor Anita Bradshaw asked me to write a letter to Lynnhurst updating our church on my journey towards ordination in the UCC.

For those of you who know me, this may serve as a "check-in" and for those who may have known me only in passing when I served as the Youth Director at Lynnhurst, or not at all, this will serve as a sort of introduction.

For the last four years, I have been serving at First Lutheran Church of Columbia Heights as the Children's and Family Ministries Director. It has been a real joy and a great learning experience to serve at a hundred year old community church.

I wanted to take a moment to share with you of two lessons I have learned as I prepare for ordination.

A few weeks ago, on my usual Sunday morning walk around the building I noticed one of my Sunday School teachers in a frantic state. "Dirty Dishes!" she said pointing across the room. "The sink is full of dirty dishes from the Charter School teachers."

"Give them here and I'll wash them." I smiled. "Sorry about the mess. I'll talk to the Principal about it."

Two years ago, First Lutheran decided to rent classroom space to a charter school. It was a big change, rooms were all doubling as classrooms, and our common hall was now the elementary school lunchroom.

And for the last two years, I have learned how important it was that our committees and church leaders from every generation were invited to have honest discussions about this change.

I learned that if people feel heard, they are much more likely to "give a little" even if they're point of view doesn't win the day. This is just as true for the third generation church member who has "seen-it-all" as it is for the new member who is just getting their feet wet in the life of our church.

And whether it is dirty dishes left in the sink or a charter school student interrupting a bible study, the congregation has been patient and understanding because everyone took part in the decision.

The second lesson I learned is how important it is to be "real" with your congregation. Our church has four healing services a year. These worship services are a time for people to come forward and ask for prayer. We pray for people suffering from chronic physical pain, a death in the family, or financial struggles.

Each service begins with a short talk from someone who has received prayer in the past and how much it helped them on their road to recovery.

At our last healing service, I offered to speak about my own history of anxiety and depression. I shared about going to therapy, getting on medication, and the many prayers I received along the way. I wanted to share how these experiences have allowed me to serve the people struggling with mental illness with compassion, coming alongside them, rather than judging them.

After my talk I had several people come forward and tell me that they were so encouraged that I had shared my story. And then something happened that our staff hadn't expected. Several long-time members asked for prayers because they were also struggling with mental health. They said that my talk allowed them to open up about an issue they had been too scared to bring up in church.

Sharing about difficult issues is a matter of time and place. And a healing service after serving for four years was the right time and place. I have garnered a reputation for keeping a cool head in stressful situations, for being cheerful and optimistic. Congregants knew me and trusted me. And if I was willing to admit my own struggles, then maybe they could admit theirs. ~ Nathan Roberts.

SETTLED PASTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE



Since completing the Church Profile for Lynnhurst Church and submitting it to the Minnesota Conference UCC and the national UCC website in early January, we have been receiving Ministerial Profiles from applicants across the nation. Interested pastors from the east coast, the west coast, the south, the northwest,

and the Midwest have expressed an interest in becoming the full time settled pastor for our church. We as a search committee are proceeding to review each applicant carefully and prayerfully. We are reviewing statements of theology, expressions of calling into the ministry, and the personal stories of each candidate. We are listening to many sermons online. We are attempting to discern which person will be the best pastor for us as we move forward as a congregation. During this process, all of our work needs to remain confidential, so we will not be able to share information about the candidates or the specific work that we are doing. I am impressed with how thoughtfully, conscientiously, and thoroughly each person on the search committee is looking at each candidate to help determine who will be best for our church.


LARGE SUITCASES NEEDED

VOLUNTEER TO IMPROVE LITERACY

We have concluded our adult education focused on illiteracy, and now we are ready to take some positive steps to address this problem. If you would like to volunteer to combat illiteracy and low literacy, there are numerous ways you can get involved. The Minnesota Literacy Council has volunteer opportunities with both adults and children in either one-to-one or classroom settings. Sharon Decker does FSI, tutoring through this

children in either one-to-one or classroom settings. Sharon Decker does ESL tutoring through this organization and is happy to talk to you about her volunteer work there. The phone number for the Council is 651 645-2277. The Minneapolis public schools are also in need of volunteers. If you search Volunteer MPS, you will find a list of local schools in need of all types of volunteers. There is a broad range of opportunities from math & reading tutoring to library helpers to special event assistance. If you are unable to commit to a weekly time, there are one time needs as well. We have had a special request from Janet Hagen, an ESL teacher, for volunteers from Lynnhurst. She is desperately in need of volunteers to work with her Transition Plus students. Jean Sutton is currently working with a Somali student through this program, and she is happy to talk to you about her experience and the process for volunteering with Minneapolis public schools.
